

Conan Dickson, PhD '04, is an Associate Practice Professor at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health in the Department of Health Policy and Management. In this role, his primary focus is on teaching and advising in the MHA program as well as MPH/DrPH Health Leadership and Management concentrations. Additionally, he is affiliated with Hopkins Business of Health Initiative (HBHI) and the Hopkins Economics of Alzheimer's Disease and Services Center (HEADS).

Dr. Dickson leverages his extensive leadership network and past management experience to bring practical and contemporary lessons to the classroom. He currently serves as the Maryland Regent for the American College of Healthcare Executives (ACHE), where he is also board certified as a Fellow; on the Board of Directors of The Healthcare Council (DC); on the Board Finance Committee for the Association of University Programs in Health Administration (AUPHA); and on the Education and Editorial Advisory Board for the Society for Health Strategy and Market Development (SHSMD).

Prior to joining the faculty full-time in March 2020, Dr. Dickson spent twenty-five years working at Johns Hopkins Medicine in a variety of leadership roles. He began his career as an administrative fellow; worked in ambulatory operations; researched patient safety & quality; led in hospital operations and medical affairs in the academic hospitals; supported leadership & governance at the community hospitals; and concluded with strategy & transformation. He also served as the program director for the JHM Administrative Fellowship for fifteen years.

Dr. Dickson received his PhD in Health Services Research from Johns Hopkins University; an MPH from Yale University; and bachelor degrees in accounting and health systems management from Auburn University. His dissertation focused on the migration of surgery from inpatient to outpatient using a diffusion of innovations model. His current research interests are in health care finance and strategy; education in leadership for health services; and clinical pastoral care.
